

Good Shepherd Sunday April 21st

April showers bring Good Shepherd Sunday, when we focus on what Jesus said: "I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep." (John 10:11) This Sunday is also the day when we encourage members to support our partner, Lutheran Social Services of Illinois (LSSI). This year, we are going to do something a bit different.

You recall that two years ago, UIF raised money for The Ukraine as that country was invaded and went to war. That event included matching funds donated by members with money from the UIF treasury. This year Council approved this matching idea for donations from members to LSSI. Your donation of \$10 will become \$20. LSSI donations from members will be collected between April 21 and Pentecost May 19. Envelopes will be available for donations to be counted and matched by the treasury. Using the designated envelopes, you will be able to give cash or checks, made out to UIF. Your donation will be added to your giving statement for tax purposes.

LSSI dates back to many individual Lutheran service institutions, such as orphanages, "old folks" homes and others, but its services have grown and adapted as societal needs have changed. During this fund raising campaign, you will hear much more about the many services provided by LSSI and the part you can play by your support. Lay Leadership Day workshops announced

Plans continue to be made for the synod's highly anticipated Lay Leadership Day on Saturday, May 18, at Our Saviour's Lutheran Church in Naperville.

Perhaps you heard about the vision for this day during last year's Synod Assembly bishop's report. Thanks to the Carlmark Fund, we're able to gather lay leaders for a morning of learning and inspiration.

The day includes brief worship, workshops (see below), a keynote speaker and a boxed lunch. All for a nominal fee of \$10. Registration is now open!

Here are the workshops (more details, including workshop presenters, to come):

Climate Justice: What are we already doing in the synod to address climate justice and what more can we do? The ELCA Blessed Tomorrow Climate Ambassador Training equips you with the knowledge, hands-on experience, and resources to speak and take action on climate change in your home, neighborhood, place of worship, community, with policymakers and beyond.

Stewardship of Space: Our buildings are mission outposts for God's work in our neighborhood, our city, and our world. Utilizing the space you have to live into the mission God has given you can be confusing and a struggle, especially if you are reimagining how you might use the space to support your mission going forward. Offering practical tips, theological insight, and highlighting some new resources available, this workshop intends to equip attendees with the knowledge they need to ask the next right questions and take the next right step in using their space for God's work in their piece of the world.

Lay Leadership & Equipping: Learn how to inspire and motivate your congregation's volunteers and leadership.

Church Governance: Basics of church leadership. What are the responsibilities of a congregation's council member? How do we understand, create and follow church constitutions, policies and procedures? With MCS Secretary Erin Clausen leading us, learn about the role and responsibilities of an elected leader.

On Monday, April 22nd, we will celebrate the 54th Earth Day. What began as one person's call to action over his concern for the environment has evolved into the largest civic event on Earth, activating billions across 192 countries to safeguard our planet and fight for a brighter future.

When Senator Gaylord Nelson of Wisconsin witnessed the massive oil spill in Santa Barbara, CA, in January of 1969, he developed the idea to organize a teach-in regarding environmental concerns on college campuses. Inspired by the student anti-war movement of that time, Nelson recruited activist, Denis Hayes, to organize the campus teachins. They chose the date of April 22nd because it fell between Spring Break and Final Exams. With a staff of 85, Hayes broadened the effort to include a wide range of organizations, faith groups, and others across the country. On the first Earth Day in 1970, 20 million Americans — at the time, 10% of the total population of the United States — took to the streets, parks and auditoriums to demonstrate against the impacts of 150 years of industrial development. Americans across the country clearly shared Senator Nelson's concern for the environment and the Earth Day movement was born.

The theme for Earth Day 2024 is Planet vs. Plastics. In recent years, many people have become aware of the impact of single-use plastics on our environment and have made choices to reduce their use of such plastics. (or donate them to New Life for Old Bags!)

This year, Earthday.org is demanding a 60% reduction in the production of <u>all</u> plastics by 2040. If you visit the Earthday.org website at https://www.earthday.org/earth-day-2024/, you will find information about the harmful effects of plastics as well as actions that you can take to be a part of the solution. Your individual choices, both small and large, can make a difference and, when joined with others, can fuel the energy we need to heal our planet.

May Book Club

The next book club is scheduled to meet on Saturday, May 18, at 10:00 am. The book that was chosen is *The Sacred Pulse: Holy Rhythms for Overwhelmed Souls* by April Fiet.

April Fiet invites us to examine the frantic patterns of our lives to reclaim the deeper, sacred pulses that pattern our days. Through stories, scripture, and practical guidance for daily living, she lays out twelve rhythms—including gardening, handcrafts, friendship, and holidays—that are both sustainable and sustaining. *The Sacred Pulse* shows us how to strip away all the competing beats we have settled for so we can tap into the joyful, holy rhythms of life.

If you are weary and worn out, or simply in need of refreshing, this book can help to restore your soul. All are welcome. Please join us.
