
Love Letters

I often think of the ways Pr. Carla tried to get us involved and not many people joining in. I felt there is too much apathy and don't know how to overcome it, even some of my own.

I love like you because when I went Church shopping in 2013 after Good Shepherd closed, your church came to the closet to what I grew up with at GS. It also helped that several GS members joined UIF over the years. Even our former GS organist Lois Cornils was the organist for UIF. (She does have a following of former GS members.) The Redeemer Chicago's worship service was too loud (Christian Rock) and the congregation was geared to 20-30 year olds. Grace in River Forest was too stuffy with the Ushers wearing carnations in their suit jackets. I did not want to go to Marshall Fields for church. Martin Luther's congregation did not seem to have any energy left. Hardly anyone sang during the service. UIF was the only church that had a wide range of ages and a somewhat high energy level due to the large membership at the time which unfortunately has gone down for various reasons. What I also liked and still do is the all welcoming nature at UIF, no matter if you are rich or poor, black or white, gay or straight. (Just look at the congregational acceptance of our current Pastor). There is a lack of snobbery in this congregation.

If UIF would close, which is a possibility down the road with our declining membership, I would feel a certain sadness that another chapter in my book of life has come to an end, but my faith in the Holy Trinity (which has been strengthened at UIF) would help guide me toward the new church for the next chapter in my life just as it did during my transition from GS to UIF.

In addition to what I found at UIF, I would also look for a congregation that has more of a handle on current world events and is willing to discuss the pros and cons of global issues rather than just watching each other in silence just eating & drinking in the fellowship hall. It is one area that I feel is missing in the make-up of the congregation and at times, makes me feel as an outsider looking in. (3 Dimensional vs. 2 Dimensional. I learned that in my high school Geometry class as well as in our high school current events club). I would also look for a congregation that has a thirst for Theological & Eschatological education beyond what is in the lectionary. The lectionary is a good starting point, but Sundays and Seasons does not go far enough for me. I have to turn to other pastors on You Tube for spiritual guidance on contemporary issues and their relation to biblical prophecy. The Israeli-Hama war is a case in point. I am a firm believer in the global politics of Oil (my international relations training at NU) and its relationship to the End Times.

Lastly, I would also look for a congregation that is willing to learn about Near Death Experiences, where people have died and either gone to heaven or hell. (You Tube has tons of these on its website.) I am also a firm believer if more people would hear of these experiences, that our church pews would start to fill up again with Christ Believers. It's a shame in my mind that the Lutheran church in general does not seem to capitalize on this.

In conclusion, I hope that whoever reads this letter begins to understand that UIF has a very nice congregation and a wonderful worship experience. Its why I keep coming back. However, the constraints put upon it by peer customs and Churchwide/Synod guidance may lead me down the road to shop for an additional church that will fulfill my spiritual based intellectual needs that are not being met at UIF.
