From the desk of . . . Pastor Carla

"Council meetings are boring." "Church councils never do anything interesting." "Why would I want to serve on council anyway?" I've heard all these statements before (in varied places). Sometimes the work of a congregational council (like our "board of directors") feels unglamorous and dry. I know that's the case. But recently, I've been experiencing our council's work as inspired and inspiring. Challenging, at times. Complex, at times. Difficult, at times. But filled with godly encouragement and leading along the way.

At the March 2022 council meeting, just after the state and city lifted mask mandates on public gatherings, United in Faith's council faced a renewed decision about whether to require or request masks. This kind of conversation can be very anxiety-producing to pastors and leaders, because there are differences of opinion and masking has become such a political hot button topic. I was impressed with United in Faith's council civil and measured discussion about this topic. We used CDC recommendations, Metropolitan Chicago synod suggested guidelines, scientific understandings, and personal reflections.

We sought to "include all in God's work" and "meet people where they are" (two of congregation's guiding principles). We wanted to make a value statement (that masks can assist us in caring for ourselves and our neighbors) while also acknowledging the difficulties that mask-wearing can cause (and the lower transmission rates in our area at this time). We also wanted to expand how we expressed our congregational welcome to all. Council members discussed all sorts of possible language and decided that our new UIF mask policy would be: "Masks Encouraged." You will see this change reflected in signage and publicity materials at UIF. There may still be settings in which we ask you to wear masks – in certain circumstances or if/when COVID mitigation measures in state or city change.

Also at March's meeting, I led United in Faith's council in a devotion using a Living Lutheran magazine article about ELCA Lutheran Disaster Response and their international work in Ukraine and neighboring countries (see link further below). As of the council meeting date (March 15), our denomination, the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, had already given \$1.3 million. According to the Living Lutheran article, "more than 2 million people are seeking refuge in neighboring countries, including Hungary, Poland, Slovakia, Romania and Moldova. There are major humanitarian concerns for both internally displaced people and refugees." (OVER)-->

FROM THE DESK OF PASTOR CARLA, CONTINUED..

Our United in Faith council was inspired by the generosity of the ELCA so far and decided to match donations from UIF members/friends to Lutheran Disaster Response. We were led by the Holy Spirit to "pray and listen for God's guidance" and to "reflect God's love," as we agreed to match disaster response donations for Ukraine from UIF friends and members. We are called to be God's hands, feet, and voice in this world, and we take that call very seriously. This is just one of the many ways we are living out our call in the world.

This means that your \$50 donation will become a \$100 donation to help the people in and around Ukraine impacted by the war and related displacement. Your gift must be given to through UIF (check written to "United in Faith Lutheran Church") so that we know how much to match (place in the white bucket with a Ukrainian flag on it – or send a check with memo line labeled "Ukraine disaster fund").

"Through the Lutheran World Federation (LWF), LDR is supporting member churches including the German Evangelical Lutheran Church of Ukraine, the Evangelical Church of the Augsburg Confession in Poland, the Evangelical Church of the Augsburg Confession in Slovakia, the Evangelical Church of the Augsburg Confession in Romania and the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Romania. These churches are distributing basic necessities such as food, water and toiletries, as well as providing pastoral and psychological care and assisting members of Roma communities and foreign nationals."

Yes, UIF's council is inspiring and inspired. (Yes, this sounds like a commercial for serving on UIF's council...) You might even offer to pick your guest up at their house – or to meet them in the parking lot and enter together. As St. Paul reminds us in Romans 10:14-15 "...how are they to call on one in whom they have not believed? And how are they to believe in one of whom they have never heard? And how are they to hear without someone to proclaim him? And how are they to proclaim him unless they are sent? As it is written, "How beautiful are the feet of those who bring good news!"

Our Clothing, the Environment and Our Health

We have all heard about ways to reduce, reuse, repurpose and recycle our clothing. Don't become a victim of Fast Fashion (cheap and low quality clothing produced quickly to meet fashion trends that are soon replaced by the next trend) by buying quality, more classic clothing. Take the wearables you no longer need to a resale shop for a second life. Shop that resale store yourself. Repair clothes you have instead of discarding and buying new - replace zippers, patch holes, sew split seams, replace buttons, mend socks. Find ways to repurpose the cloth in clothes you no longer wear - make new clothing items, towels, a quilt, rags for cleaning, a tote bag. Receive and give Hand Me Downs.

Now let's take a look at the fabrics themselves. Many fabrics contain harmful chemicals. Some water and stain resistant materials contain PFAS, a class of about 9,000 compounds called "forever chemicals" because they don't naturally break down and are found in our soil, water and air. They are linked to cancer, reduced immunity, liver disease, kidney problems, birth defects and others. More than 60% of our clothes are made with synthetic textiles derived from oil — textiles like acrylic, nylon and polyester. Producing these synthetic fibers has a profound impact on our climate. It is a source of global warming. In addition, BPA, another harmful chemical, is found in these plastic textiles and can be absorbed through our skin. Consider non cotton socks worn for hours at a time and those cozy fleece items we loved to wear during the pandemic. BPA is also shed during laundering and enters our water systems.

So what can we do as consumers? Look for and purchase items that are PFAS free (read the tags) and that use natural fabrics. Natural fabrics, derived from plants and animals, include cotton, wool, silk, linen, hemp, cashmere, denim, leather, jute, ramie, camel hair, and mohair. As advocates for our health and environment, hold both the oil and gas sector and their downstream customers in the apparel sector accountable for putting the health of all of our children and our planet at risk. Keep the petroleum in the ground and the petrochemicals out of our homes.
