UNITED IN FAITH LUTHERAN CHURCH EDUCATION ENDOWMENT SCHOLARSHIP

United in Faith Lutheran Church has an established an Education Endowment Scholarship Fund which is available to members of our congregation. Students who have a financial need can apply for assistance. Eligible awards can be for any Christian pre-school through high school as well as any post-secondary school and can include special educational needs or gifts at any level of education.



Each application is carefully reviewed by the Education Endowment Scholarship Committee. Awards are based on need and funds available. The application forms are available in the church office and must be completed in full to be considered for a scholarship for the school year 2021-2022 & returned no later than February 28, 2021. Place the completed form in the church mail box marked "Scholarship" located in the hallway or give to any scholarship committee member. All information on the application will be treated as confidential.

- Applicants must be an active member of United in Faith Lutheran Church.
- Identify, to the best of your knowledge, all school related expenses for the school year, plus any other source of income or assistance you have to meet those expenses.
- Applicants and their parents(s)/guardian(s)/care giver(s) must participate in the life of United in Faith Church. This can include, but is not limited to: serving as an acolyte, usher, reader, or assisting minister, Sunday School aide or teacher, participation in fund raising activities, and assisting with church Scholarship Application
- Attendance at worship is required.

The Committee will then give careful consideration for awards on each application. Applicants will be notified of the Committee's decision by March 31, 2021. An applicant may receive a scholarship in subsequent years as long as they meet the requirements. Scholarship amounts may vary from year to year based on the number of applicants and funds available each year.

Keeping the Twelve Days of Christmas at Home

Okay y'all, hang on to your britches. I have some news. Despite what many retail outlets will have you believe, the Twelve Days of Christmas do not occur in the twelve days before Christmas, but in the twelve days following. And these twelve days, well they are the actual Christmas Season as originally dedicated on the Christian Year Calendar. What comes before Christmas Day is the season of Advent, not Christmas.

Christmas runs from Christmas Day until January 5, which is also called Twelfth Night. January 6, is called Epiphany. Epiphany is the day in which the arrival of the Magi (or Wise Men) is celebrated. Their arrival marked the moment that Christ's identity as the Son of God was revealed to non-Jewish persons, ergo it was a pretty big "epiphany". Back in the olden days of yore Christmas trees were not put up until Christmas Eve because the Christmas season did not begin until December 25. The following twelve days leading to Epiphany, were then the time for all the merry making and party throwing and frolicking about in fancy clothes. A large Twelfth Night party was often the end of the season, sometimes even with a reversal of roles – the servants of the wealthy would be served by their employers and all would celebrate together. January 6 was then the day when the tree came down and the decorations went back into storage – a tradition many still hold on to.

Here are a few of my favorite ideas on how to celebrate this season in modern times! Learn the Alternative Meanings for the Song

I have always loved the "Twelve Days of Christmas" song. A few years ago I stumbled across a children's book that paired the twelve verses with twelve basics of Christianity. After digging around I learned that some people believe that the Twelve Days of Christmas was a way to teach children their religious catechism through symbolism and song.

Whether or not this story is true ancient history or modern folklore, the fact remains that you can easily pair each verse of this traditional Christmas tune with the most basic and fundamental Christian teachings, which can be a fun inold and young alike.

The pairings go like this:

A partridge in a pear tree: Jesus

Two turtle doves: The Old and New Testaments

Three French hens: Faith, hope, and love

Four calling birds: The Four Gospels

Five gold rings: The Torah/Pentateuch, first five books of the Old Testament

Six geese a-laying: The six days of Creation

Seven swans a-swimming: Seven gifts of the Holy Spirit

Eight maids a-milking: Eight Beatitudes



Nine ladies dancing: Nine fruits of the Holy Spirit Ten lords a-leaping: The Ten Commandments

Recently the ELCA Church Council affirmed a new Future Church design at its fall meeting, Nov. 12-14. I'm sure you're wondering what that means, which is why I am emailing you.

I think we all recognize that the ELCA continues in a pattern of macro decline, as do other mainline churches. The majority of our members are aging, and our membership profile does not reflect the diversity of the United States or the kingdom of God.

Yes, Future Church takes those trends into account, but that's not the primary reason for a new design. We know the world needs to hear the gospel, because the way of Jesus is the way of life and grace. Future Church is based on the strong belief that members, congregations, synods and the churchwide organization must work together to share a powerful witness of the gospel in the world, engaging our current members in new and innovative ways while inviting more young and diverse people to experience God's grace in action. It envisions a world experiencing the difference that God's grace and love in Christ make for all people and creation.

More information about how all members of this church can be part of growing this church into the future will be available in the coming months, including a virtual town hall for rostered ministers with me.
